THE HUNDRED LANGUAGES OF CHILDREN

Increasingly, educators from America and Australia are going to Northern Italy to visit the schools of Reggio Emilia. After the second world war, a school was built literally by a young teacher and people in the local community. This school has developed into a whole system. The municipality of Reggio Emilia caters for 40% of the 0-3 year olds and 50 % of 3-6 year olds in its municipal centres. 12% of the local government budget goes to programmes for infants and young children.

The community and teachers who started the first school were driven by a horror of the past and how the future could be improved by a progressive, collaborative approach to education. Over the decades a strong educational community have built up a system that works. "The principal

educational vehicle involves youngsters in ling-term engrossing projects which are carried out in a beautiful, healthy, lovefilled setting" (Howard Gardner).

A recent Australian visitor was struck by the variety of projects the children had become involved in. A few from the list:

- How houses are built
- The dinosaur project
- How many greens are there?
- Shadows at night
- The Rights of the child.

In the entryway of the Diana School some five year olds have designed a poster that proclaims their view of children's Rights, quote:

"Such exploration of ideas is exciting and can only be of benefit to the whole community."
