## NSW group plans own scuba club

Eastern Region hopes to have its own AFP Scuba Diving Club up-and-running well before the end of the year. And much of the thanks goes to Senior Constable Mark Hows.

Mark, 28, who joined the AFP after working in a bank, now holds the title of Dive Master and is a member of the PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors).

"My interest in scuba diving be-

gan soon after I joined the AFP eight years ago," he said.

"It has developed from there. Now we have a number of other qualified divers in Eastern Region and a much larger number in the learner stage."

Mark's Dive Master grading enables him to operate as a tour guide and leader, but as the formal tests and medicals are arranged through the Pro Dive organisation, it is this organisation which runs all the instruction classes.

"But they have given us such a solid discount arrangement that the association works well," Mark said. "It would normally cost up to \$250 for the two-week part-time initial course around either Drummoyne or Coogee. The price for AFP members is \$150.

"The same type of discount exists on all equipment".

## Acquisition for soccer squad

The round ball code — soccer — has always been popular in Eastern Region, with the AFP team one of the better performers in Sydney's Canterbury-Marrackville regional competition.

And the acquisition in recent months of 20-year-old utility player Mark Mesaglio has certainly strengthened the squad.

Mark, who joined the AFP in August 1983, was until the end of last season a well-formed NSW State League player with the well-known Melita Eagles Club.

Son of Italian migrants, Mark's soccer began in primary school and through his local St John's team in the suburb of Auburn.

He progressed through the extensive Sydney schoolboy competitions and was a member of the NSW Under-16 squad in the days when it was perhaps the strongest in Australia.

"Shift work cut into my opportunity to give full attention to training three nights a week," said Mark. "But I'm enjoying immensely playing in the AFP's own team.

"It keeps me fit and the standard of play is excellent."



Mark said various trips had been organised to provide a change from diving around various Sydney locations.

"I'd have to rate as perhaps the best our trip to Jervis Bay, in the Australian Capital Territory," he said.

Mark said with some 19 or 20 Eastern Region members either qualified divers or close to it numbers would soon be sufficient to formally launch the AFP's own scuba diving club.

"Apart from myself, other members who are qualified divers are Steve McTackett, Alan Crowe, Kim Weidenback, Gary Welch, Ted Bunt and Mick McGreevy," he said.

Australian Federal Police members plan to send athletic and soccer teams to the Inaugural World Police and Fire Games to be held next August in San Jose, California.

Travel arrangements to the US are being conducted by Gullivers Sport Travel and consist of a long and short trip. The short trip, which covers the games and limited sight-seeing and lasts 15 days, costs about \$2,500, excluding pocket money. The long trip consists of a 20-day trip and costs about \$3,500, excluding pocket money.

Arrangements are being made in conjunction with the NSW Fire Brigade and NSW Police.

The more members attending the cheaper the price will be. The prices quoted are for single rooms only. The cost is cheaper if two or more athletes are prepared to share.

Sports covered include pistol shooting, cycling, darts, archery, swimming and athletics.

June and a deposit must be paid immediately.

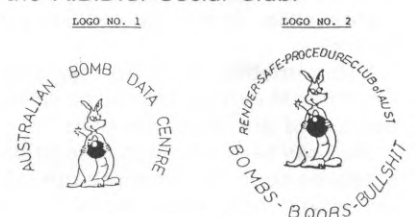

Only orders with enclosed money orders or cheques will be accepted. Cheques should be made payable to the A.B.D.C. Social Club.



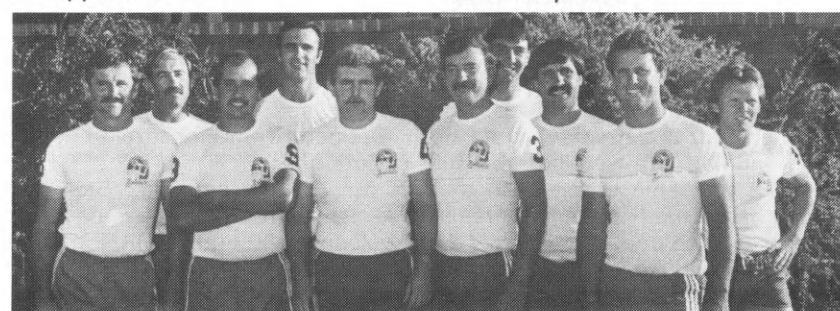
## Touch football takes on Fire probe
