Central has stability and commitment

EADQUARTERED on the edge of downtown Adelaide, Central Region polices Commonwealth law in South Australia and is lead by Commander Don McCulloch.

Working to Commander McCulloch are the Fraud and General Crime Branch and the Intelligence and Drug Operations Branch.

Central Region's high rate of police and staff retention has created a bank of expertise able to tackle investigations that in recent years have included the theft of 600 million-year-old fossils, major drug busts and complex frauds.

Many of the region's members can trace their police careers back to when the Commonwealth Police provided security for the rocket testing range at Woomera and when South Australia administered the Northern Territory. Other members have been drawn to South Australia more recently by the charm, history and way of life that has made South Australia a popular destination with domestic and international tourists.

"Once a member accepts a posting to Central Region they generally want to stay," said Detective Superintendent Brian Brinkler.

The region has a strong team ethos which carries through to leisure-time activities. Central Region has competed in the local police basketball competition for many years, fielding a mixed gender team with ages ranging from the eager, early twenties to fighting fit fifties.

The region's members have involved themselves in community activities at all levels including club swimming, the Scouting movement, the Youth Hostels Association and administration in grade football.

It was a Central Region member who co-ordinated the AFP's first national Aboriginal Cultural Awareness seminar at Barton College in April of this year.

Central Region takes seriously the AFP commitment to higher education, currently having a full quota enrolled in studies under the Tertiary Assistance Scheme.
