STROUD'S JUDICIAL DICTIONARY OF WORDS & PHRASES, 6th EDITION

Stroud goes digital

The sixth edition of the extensively revised *Stroud's Judicial Dictionary of Words & Phrases* was launched 19 October 2000. This classic English work with its thousands of definitions of legal words and phrases plus referrals to statutes and cases, has been a key reference and research tool for many years and a new updated edition is most welcome 'Have you tried Stroud's?' is a familiar suggestion to most of us. News for those interested in flexible delivery is that the 6th edition is also available on CDROM.

Hard copy edition

Stroud attempts to offer definitions of 'virtually every legal term in English', and while updated to include the latest terms and phrases, the new hard copy edition consolidates much of the earlier material into what the publisher claims to be a more manageable three volumes. Longer entries are re-organised or subdivided in an attempt to make research easier. Currency is maintained by an annual paper supplement, charged for on release.

Stroud on CDROM

Enhanced access is provided by the new CDROM version which is available for standalone or network use. Digitisation makes it possible to directly search for a definition, phrase or case and there are hypertext links between related definitions. To assist in searching there is a browsable table of contents Probably the biggest advantage of the CDROM version is the link to a web-based updating service.

The limitations of CDROM technology, especially for remote access, may detract from the new digital version. A totally web-based product may have been more acceptable to many potential customers.
