### FISHERIES CONVENTION

During the recent Pacific Islands Forum meeting in Kiribati the Prime Minister of Australia signed the Convention on Conservation and Management of the Highly Migratory Fish Stocks in the Central and Western Pacific Region. This convention aims to advance the sustainable management of the region's fishing resources. Agreement has finally been reached on the convention after six years of negotiations. Countries involved are Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands as well as other important fishing countries such as Japan, Korea and Taiwan Australia's main interest in the convention is for sustainable management of the \$60 million dollar tuna fisheries industry.
