NEW APPOINTMENTS

Dr. K.A. Ziegert who taught as a Temporary Lecturer in the Department of Jurisprudence, Sydney University, in 1980, and who is currently working on the sociology of law in the Max-Planck Institute für ausländisches und internationales Privatrecht, Hamburg, will rejoin the Department as Lecturer in August 1982.

The appointment of Dr. W. Sadurski as Temporary Lecturer in the Department of Jurisprudence, Sydney University, has been extended to August 1982.

Professor J.L.C. Chipman, Foundation Professor of Philosophy in Wollongong University, has accepted as a fractional appointment, a three year Visiting Professorship in the Department of Jurisprudence, Sydney University, following agreement by the two Universities concerned.

Knud Haakonssen's *The Science of a Legislator; The Natural Jurisprudence of David Hume and Adam Smith* has been published by Cambridge University Press. Dr. Haakonssen, currently Lecturer in political science in Victoria University (Wellington, New Zealand), will move to a research fellowship in the History of Ideas Unit of the A.N.U.'s Institute of Advanced Studies in February to edit a collection of works by and to study the thought and influence of John Millar, Adam Smith's pupil and successor as Professor of Jurisprudence in the University of Glasgow.
