

Eight steps to approve public works

To gain approval for a proposed public work, there is an eight-step process.

- Identification by a proponent agency of the need to gain Public Works Committee approval for a proposed work.
- Preparation by the proponent of a detailed submission for the Committee.
- 3. **Referral** of the proposal by a Minister to the Committee.
- Research the Committee secretariat receives and reviews submissions, organises a site inspection, and arranges and advertises the public hearing.
- 5. Site inspection.
- 6. Public hearing/s and follow-up.
- Reporting when all the evidence has been collected and considered, the Committee prepares a report on the proposed work, with recommendations, for presentation to the Parliament.
- 'Expediency motion' moved by the Minister, after the Government reviews the report. This must be passed by the House for the proposal to proceed.

Recent Approvals

In the last 12 months the Public Works Committee has approved works costing \$352 million. These include:

- new Commonwealth Leaw Courts in Adelaide, SA (\$76 milllion);
- fit-out for Central Office Building for the Department of Immigrration, Belconnen, ACT (\$26m);
- CSIRO Energy Centre at Steel River, Newcastle, NSW (\$28rm);
- redevelopment of RAA\F Base Edinburgh, SA (\$40m);
- fit-out of new leased paremises for the Australian Bureau of Sitatistics, Belconnen, ACT (\$23m);
- Construction of mixed residential dwellings for Defence Housing art Stirling, ACT (\$11m);
- new office accommoditation for the ABC, Perth, WA (\$26m); and
- refurbishment of the R\u00e4eserve Bank Building, Sydney, NSW/ (\u00a921m).

The Committee is currenttly assessing proposed works worth \$3375 million, including new freight and passenger facilities at Rumah Baru, West Island, Cocos (Keeling) Islands; a suite of defence facility/ projects in Queensland (at Oakey, Canungra and

Townsville); and defence housing in the ACT (at the Royal Military College, Duntroon).

The Public Works Committee was also recently referred works on Christmas Island associated with a proposed new space facility.
