# Somerset Richard Lowry-Corry, Earl of Belmore

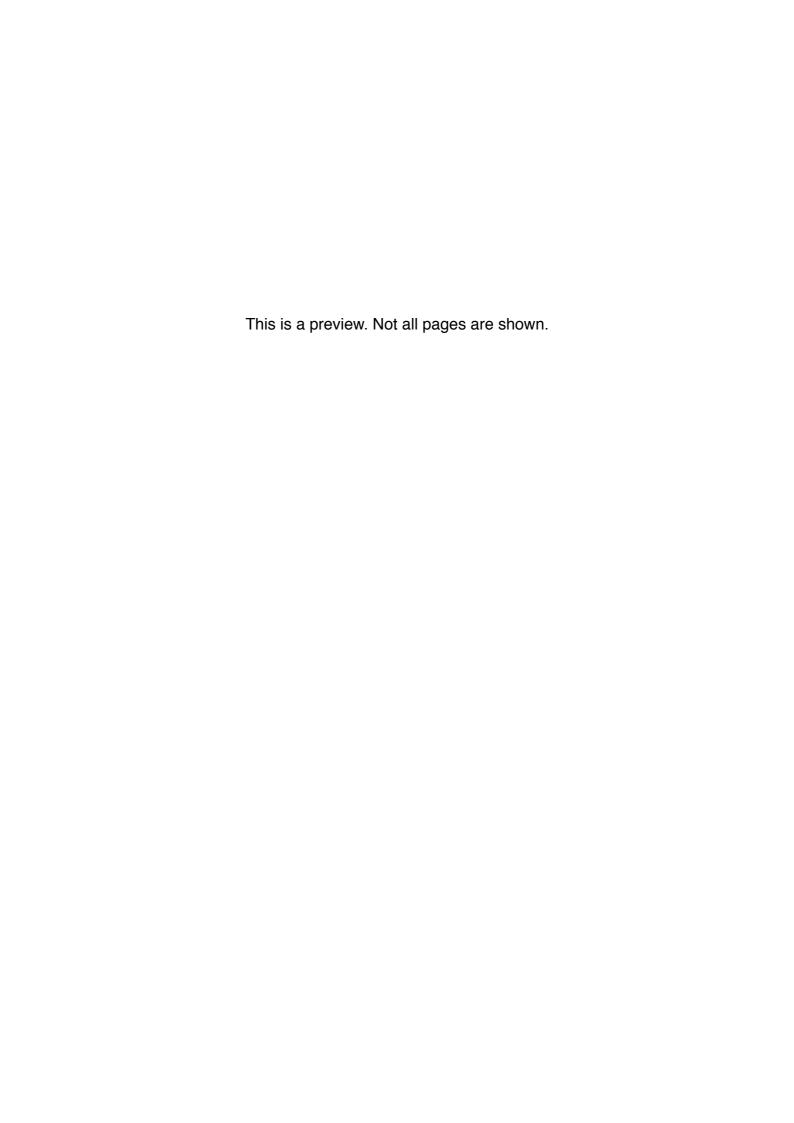
(8 January 1868 – 21 February 1872)

Somerset Richard Lowry-Corry, eldest son of Armar Lowry-Corry, third Earl of Belmore, was born on 9 April 1835 and succeeded aged ten to the Earldom on his father's death. Educated at Eton and Cambridge, he sat in the House of Lords from 1857 as an elected peer for Ireland. Married to Gladstone's niece and with a cousin serving as secretary to Disraeli, he was thus persona grata to both political groups and enjoyed a rising reputation as a Young Conservative. Successful committee work won him in 1866 the office of Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Home Affairs. For a time he represented Treasury in the Lords. Despite this rapid rise his appointment in 1867 as Governor of New South Wales excited a certain unease in the colony and critical comment in the Saturday Review which held that a colony with responsible government needed as Governor not merely an elegant or aristocratic social leader but a man of judgement and political knowledge, attributes acquired only by long official experience. So to bring in an outsider, no matter how skilled, was to deny merited promotion to those professional Governors who, equipped with such expertise, were now rising steadily in the colonial service. Hinting at a "groundless prejudice of caste or a gross love of jobbery", the Saturday Review concluded:

if peers or peers' sons are the best fitted for colonial governments let them get the appointment. But let them show their aptitude by running the same previous career with less favoured competitors.<sup>1</sup>

The *Sydney Morning Herald* reprinted these remarks less than a fortnight before Belmore arrived in a colony which was still loudly lamenting the departure of Sir John Young. Moreover, his known role as a Protestant Ulster landlord scarcely recommended him to the numerous and



Still young, at 37 and 30 respectively, the Belmores proceeded to lead a quietly active life. Anne seems to have recovered her health, to produce eight more children. Belmore resumed control of his Fermanagh estates, serving as leader of the Irish Landowners' Convention. He resumed his studies, producing a history of the Corry family, *Parliamentary Memoirs of Fermanagh and Tyrone* and contributed articles to the *Ulster Journal of Archaeology*. He returned to public duties, serving as president of a commission to inquire into the affairs of Dublin University. In 1872 he was appointed KCMG and in 1890 GCMG. Above all, he continued to appear in the House of Lords, where he became something of a champion of Australian and Pacific interests on which he now spoke with that ring of confidence which he had once so sadly lacked. He died on 6 April 1913.
