# Sir Robert William Duff

(29 May 1893 – 15 March 1895)

### Naval officer and landowner

Robert William Duff was descended from a long line of Duffs of Fetteresso with estates mainly in Banffshire. His father assumed the surname Abercromby on inheriting his mother's estates including Glasshaugh. Robert William was born on 8 May 1835 in London,1 only son of Arthur Duff Abercromby of Glasshaugh, Banffshire, Scotland, and his wife Elizabeth, née Innes. He was educated at a school at Blackheath, London.<sup>2</sup> A grandson of Rear Admiral Robert Duff of Fetteresso, in 1848 he joined the Royal Navy. Commissioned Sub-Lieutenant in May 1854 and promoted to Lieutenant on 5 January 1856, he served in HMS Atalanta, based at Devonport. From December he was based at Queenstown, in the screw steam flagship HMS Hogue, and by March 1858 in the Nile. In December that year he was serving on the Mediterranean Station in the Doris.<sup>3</sup> He continued to draw full pay until he retired with the rank of Commander on 1 April 1870,<sup>4</sup> although he held no further sea-going posts. On 21 February 1871 Duff married Louisa, daughter of Sir William Scott, sixth Baronet, at St Paul's Church, Wilton Place, London.<sup>5</sup>

Following the death on 30 December 1861<sup>6</sup> of his uncle, Robert Duff, Abercromby succeeded to his extensive property, including Fetteresso Castle, Kincardineshire, and changed his name to Duff. A man of wealth and position, he owned three other estates, Glasshaugh, Coulter and Auchenderren, in Banffshire,<sup>7</sup> and was Deputy-Lieutenant and a Justice of the Peace for Banffshire, Aberdeenshire and Kincardineshire. He was a keen sportsman and a good shot, but long before the repeal of the game laws that banned the use of guns on tenanted land, he allowed his tenants to kill rabbits. Duff was a member of Brooks's, the Devonshire, the National Liberal, the Army and Navy and the Turf clubs. This is a preview. Not all pages are shown.
