# Chapter 4

# Social work following sudden and unexpected death

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# **Chapter summary**

Regardless of the place in which they work, social workers need to feel confident that they are prepared for and can respond effectively and sensitively to the bereaved following sudden and unexpected death. This chapter provides an overview of legal responses to sudden and unexpected death and considers the role that social workers have to play in offering intervention and ongoing support to the bereaved.

## Introduction

In 2011 in Australia almost 147,000 people died (ABS 2013). Deaths from all causes may occur suddenly and unexpectedly. They may be unintentional or intentional and can occur anywhere – at home, at work, on the sports field, on the road, in health services or anywhere else. Injury is the greatest cause

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### Notes

- Tasmania and the Northern Territory far exceeded this rate (with rates of 97.2 and 60.0 per 100,000 persons respectively).
- In Victoria, for example, the coroner is required to investigate 'reviewable deaths', which are deaths of a second or subsequent child of a parent as broadly defined (Coroners Act 2008 (Vic)). The coroner does not investigate children who are stillborn nor the death of children who lived their entire lives in hospital unless otherwise determined by a coroner (Coroners Court of Victoria 2010). Medical practitioners and the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages must tell the coroner when they identify a reviewable death (Coroners Act 2008 (Vic)).
