Meredith Blake is Associate Professor at the School of Law at the University of Western Australia and is currently Deputy Head (Students) of the Law School. She has taught and researched in the areas of health law and criminal law for over 15 years, with an emphasis on the law and ethics of end-of-life decision-making, consent to health care treatment and elder law. Meredith has been a member of the UWA Human Research Ethics Committee for several years, is a Board member of the Mental Health Law Centre (WA) and is a convenor of the Australian Research Network on Law and Ageing.
