The Native Title Conference logo design will be created from the work of Alick Tipoti.

Alick Tipoti is a Torres Strait Islander who is guided by the traditional cultural practices of his people. He

> believes in the Zugubal who were spoken about for many years by his ancestors. He is most diligent about what he sees as his responsibility to document the stories. genealogies, songs and other aspects of his culture so that it available for future generations to learn, understand and practice.

> Alick speaks his native language, Kala Lagaw Ya of the Maluilgal nation of Zenadh Alick believes language is the vital ingredient that binds all cultures in the world today. 'Without your become language you foreigner, lost in another persons culture. Singing and dancing are forms of art that out from centrepiece called language.

Everything you do, traditionally or culturally, evolves from a language. When you know the language, you know your culture.'

The work is entitled Waru Thurul which means turtle tracks. After the Solal season (mating turtle), many turtles are seen crawling up beaches of the small islands throughout Zenadh Kes.

In this print Alick depicts the many threats to the life cycle of the green back turtle throughout Zenadh-Kes. Humans and wild pigs, and goanna lizards dig up the turtle nests to feed on the eggs. Fish and birds prey on the young hatchlings struggling to survive on the beach and in the
