## Video review: Beneath Clouds

Beneath Clouds is the story of two young Aboriginal teenagers who, for different reasons, find themselves hitchhiking along the roadway to Sydney.

ena (Danielle Hall) is a young schoolgirl who sets out on a journey to escape her dreary life and to try and find her father. Vaughn (Damian Pitt) has escaped from a country detention centre to visit his dying mother.

They cross paths by chance and while both have an innate distrust of each other when they first meet at a bus shelter, a trust and mutual respect develops between them.

The performances of first time actors Danielle Hall and Damian Pitt are remarkable. Their characters are real and complex and it is their 'realness' which draws us into the film. The most powerful scenes in *Beneath Clouds* are due to the characters' movements and silence.

The film was written and directed by Ivan Sen, a young Aboriginal film maker who grew up in New South Wales in an Aboriginal community. Like the character Lena, Ivan comes from a diverse and mixed background. His mother is Aboriginal and his father half-German and half-Hungarian. It is Ivan's own experiences of growing up in a culturally diverse family, which are mirrored in Lena's own search for identity. In the film, Lena's mother

is Aboriginal and her estranged father is Irish. With photos of her Irish father and of Ireland, Lena embarks on a journey to Sydney to escape her life, which is driven by small-town desperation.

Vaughn is on the run from the police after he escapes from a detention centre and Lena hides his identity in a few close incidents with the police. Vaughn is an angry teenager, desperate to break free from his life in the bush and his life in detention. When Vaughn first meets Lena, he is wary of her because she looks white and she gives him no reason to contradict this, until an elderly Aboriginal woman asks Lena where her people come from.

Beneath Clouds recently won director Ivan Sen the best first feature award at the Berlin International Film Festival. It is a subtle yet powerful Australian movie about the search for identity, belonging and understanding. Lena and Vaughn struggle with themselves and the film compels us to share their struggles. Their road trip is set amongst the harsh Australian landscape; the road is flat and the countryside dry and unforgiving. They are figures in a landscape, figures beneath clouds.
