The following is a brief outline of what we have done so far, or what we hope to do:

- 1. Letters to major papers calling for photographs or reminiscences have caused a few people to contact us. We now seek, through *InCite*, your help. Please let us know if you have any stories to tell, or photographs to lend us.
- Requests have been made for a special stamp to celebrate the occasion, as well as a first day cover.
- 3. An oral history programme is being developed, in the hope that the founders will be taped and photographed. Dr Maxine Rochester is co-ordinating this programme with staff from the National Library and the Canberra College of Advanced Education. A video is planned.
- 4. As the Association is a national body, and the anniversary should be celebrated throughout Australia, we have asked librarians in each State and Territory to coordinate celebrations in their State. When arrangements with coordinators have been finalised their names will be published in *InCite*.
- The Committee is approaching library suppliers for sponsorship.
- Two special publications are being planned.
 One will be written by Jean Whyte; the other by Harrison Bryan.

OBITUARY

PATRICIA ANNE GILBERT



Patricia Anne Gilbert was born in Deloraine, Tasmania on 30 November 1934 and died in a motor accident near her home town on Sunday, 4 August 1985.

Pat Gilbert joined the State Library of Tasmania in 1960 and in her early years there she gained wide experience in public lending and reference library work, upon which she was able to build when in 1964 she became a librarian in the Division of External Services. Her day-to-day contacts with local council officers and representatives were important factors in the willingness with which local councils entered into the agreements underlying the Regional Library systems developed in the 1970s.

Pat played an important role during the 1960s and 70s in persuading local councils to upgrade library buildings and provide improved furniture and equipment. In the Division of External Services, Pat was also responsible for government departmental libraries, a job she took most seriously and extended into an interest in and enthusiasm for special library services in general.

With the establishment of a number of Regional Library systems during the 1970s, Pat was able to bring her considerable experience to bear, from 1974, as Divisional Librarian with responsibility for the remaining unregionalised parts of the State Library service, including the Hobart Lending Library, where she was able to prepare municipal councils for the regional groupings which they subsequently formed. During this period she worked with Barbara Sattler and others in the establishment of the Hear-a-Book scheme for the print-handicapped.

In December 1976, as Derwent Regional Librarian, Pat began what for her was the most satisfying period of her career, in which she took charge of the newly-created Derwent Regional Library, saw the region established in its new headquarters in 1979 and proceeded to develop a community library service which bears the stamp of her strong commitment to people as individuals with individual library needs.

She was the first chairman of the Tasmanian Advisory Committee on Library Services to the Disabled where she established standards, guidelines and plans for action.

Pat's prodigious energy and her highly developed sense of the ridiculous were well expressed in 1972 during a trip to Europe when, in a series of letters to staff she described an incredible number of ports of call with such comments as: 'I went to Vienna and managed to get a mass with the Vienna Boys' Choir and to a training session with the Lippinzaner horses (I had to fight my way in but managed it thanks to my training in football grounds). The horses, as distinct from the people, were beautifully behaved.'

The State Library of Tasmania, State Library staff, and the people of this State have lost an invaluable employee, colleague and friend in the untimely death of Patricia Anne Gilbert.
