Margery C Ramsay and Barrett Reid Scholarships winners announced

On Tuesday 14 October the Margery C Ramsay and Barrett Reid Scholarships were presented by Dr Vicki Williamson, member of the Library Board of Victoria on behalf of the State Library of Victoria. The Margery C Ramsay Scholarship was awarded to Ms Patti Manolis, manager of the Maribyrnong Library Service and the Barrett Reid Scholarship to Ms Helen Zibell, operations manager of the Mildura Rural City Council Library Service. The recipients each received a scholarship to the value of \$15 000.

Ms Manolis said she is honoured receiving the Margery C Ramsay scholarship and excited by how it will provide her the opportunity for professional and personal development. Ms Manolis will use the scholarship to undertake a study tour of public libraries in East Timor. During this time she will study and document services and activities, as well as work towards establishing a relationship between the Victorian Public Library Network and libraries in East Timor.

Ms Zibell will use the Barrett Reid Scholarship to attend the *Corsortia in the next 25 years* conference. She will also undertake a study tour to examine the operations and management of library consortia in Minnesota and Wisconsin. Both of these American states have numerous consortia arrangements in place to support public library service delivery, particularly in relation to library management system.

The scholarships are named in honour of eminent librarians the late Margery C Ramsay and the late Barrett Reid. Margery Ramsay began her career at the Ballarat Municipal Libraries in 1946, before moving to the State Library of Tasmania and then the State Library of Victoria, where she was principal librarian from 1974 to 1981. Barrett Reid worked in various fields. He was executive officer of the Public Libraries Division at the State Library of Victoria from 1967 to 1982 and was instrumental in the development of library services across the State.
