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A Bill for an Act to protect Australia's native forests, and for related purposes

Preamble

Recognising the irreplaceable ecological and cultural values of Australia's native forests and their importance to Australia and the world, this Act provides permanent protection for those forests.

The protection and conservation of Australia's native forests, and the species in them, gives effect to Australia's international obligations arising from the Convention for the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage and the Convention on Biological Diversity, and is a matter of international concern.

Native forests and the species in them are part of the heritage distinctive of the Australian nation, and because of the lack or inadequacy of any other available means for its protection or conservation, it is peculiarly appropriate that measures for the protection or conservation of native forests be taken by the Parliament and Government of the Commonwealth as the National Parliament and Government of Australia.

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Part 1—Preliminary

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1 Short title

This Act may be cited as the *Native Forest Protection Act 1996*.

2 Commencement

This Act commences on 31 December 1996.

3 Objectives

The object of this Act is to provide protection for Australia's native forests by:

- (a) phasing out the export of woodchips from native forests; and
- (b) prohibiting logging in defined categories of native forest on public land immediately; and
- (c) prohibiting the export of woodchips from defined categories of native forests immediately; and
- (d) implementing a transitional strategy for the wood products industry.

4 Act to bind Crown

This Act binds the Crown in all its capacities.

5 Interpretation

In this Act, unless the contrary intention appears:

financial corporation means a financial corporation formed within the limits of the Commonwealth to which paragraph 51(xx) of the Constitution applies.

1 2	<i>foreign corporation</i> means a foreign corporation to which paragraph 51(xx) of the Constitution applies.
3 4	<i>forest</i> means a vegetation community dominated by trees with a projective foliage cover greater than 30%.
5	<i>high conservation value native forest</i> has the meaning given by section 6.
7 8 9 10	native forest means forest dominated by tree species native to the locality in which it occurs and where natural regeneration processes operate either fully or in part for recovery of canopy structure following natural or artificial disturbance.
11 12 13 14	old growth native forest means native forest that is ecologically mature (the upper stratum or overstorey is in the late mature to over-mature phases) and has been subjected to negligible unnatural disturbance such as logging, roading and clearing.
15 16	plantation means an area of trees planted and managed in an agricultural context for purposes including wood production.
17 18 19	rainforest means native forest which is fire sensitive, has a more or less continuous closed canopy of variable height and has a characteristic diversity of species and life forms, and includes:
20 21 22	(a) transitional and seral communities with sclerophyll emergents that are of similar botanical composition to mature rainforest in which sclerophyll emergents are absent; and
23 24	(b) disturbed native forests that can be expected to recover the defined characteristics.
25	species includes a sub-species.
26 27 28	<i>trading corporation</i> means a trading corporation formed within the limits of the Commonwealth to which paragraph $51(xx)$ of the Constitution applies.
29 30	wilderness means any area larger than 3000 hectares which has a National Wilderness Inventory wilderness quality of 12 or greater,

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and any area identified as wilderness under the Wilderness Ac	:t

World Heritage Convention means the Convention for the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage that has been adopted by the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation, being the convention a copy of the English text of which is set out in the Schedule to the World Heritage Properties Conservation Act 1983.

6 High conservation value native forest

A *high conservation value native forest* is a native forest on public land that satisfies one or more of the following paragraphs:

- (a) a native forest growing on land within a subcatchment containing rainforest or within 500 metres of rainforest, whichever is the lesser area;
- (b) a native forest place listed on the Register of the National Estate or the Interim Register of the National Estate for their biological values;
- (c) a World Heritage Area identified under the *World Heritage Properties Conservation Act 1983*, a place that the Commonwealth is obliged to protect under the World Heritage Convention, or a place identified as having world heritage value;
- (d) a subcatchment or area of at least 500 hectares surrounding sites in which any of the following species have been recorded since 1 January 1980:
 - (i) species listed in Schedule 1 of the *Endangered Species Protection Act 1992*;
 - (ii) species listed as endangered or vulnerable in the *Nature Conservation (Wildlife) Regulation 1994* of Queensland (for sites in Queensland);
 - (iii) species listed in Schedule 12 of the *National Parks and* Wildlife Act 1974 of New South Wales (for sites in New South Wales);

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Part 2—Protection of Native Forests

7 Unlawful acts, high conservation value native forests

4	(1) A person must not:
5	(a) take wood or clear vegetation from, or destroy vegetation in
6	a high conservation value native forest after 1 January 1997
7	or
8	(b) trade in, keep, move or process wood harvested after 1
9	January 1997 from a high conservation value native forest.
10	Penalty: 1,000 penalty units.
11	(2) Subsection (1) has effect:
12	(a) in relation to acts done by any person in relation to a high
13	conservation value native forest that:
14	(i) is or is part of an area identified as a World Heritage
15	Area under the World Heritage Properties
16	Conservation Act 1983; or
17	(ii) is or is part of a place that the Commonwealth is
18	obliged to protect under the World Heritage

2	8 Prohibition of exports
3 4	(1) A person must not export from Australia after 1 January 1999 woodchips obtained or derived from any native forest.
5	Penalty: 1,000 penalty units.
6	(2) Subsection (1) applies to all people.
7	9 Enforcement
8 9 10	(1) The Federal Court may, on the application of any person, grant an injunction restraining a person from doing an act that is unlawful because of section 7 or 8.
11 12 13 14 15	(2) If an application is made to the Federal Court for an injunction restraining a person from doing an act, the Federal Court may, if is the opinion of the Court it is desirable to do so, before determining the application, grant an interim injunction restraining the person from doing the act pending the determination of the application.
16	10 Phase out of export of unprocessed wood
17	The Minister must ensure that the export of woodchips obtained or
18 19	derived from native forests that are not high conservation value native forests does not exceed:
20 21	(a) 4 million green tonnes for woodchips obtained or derived from 1 January 1997 to 31 December 1997; or
22	(b) 2 million green tonnes for woodchips obtained or derived
23	from 1 January 1998 to 31 December 1998.

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Part 3—Miscellaneous

11	Minister	to	prepare	transition	strategy

The Minister must prepare a strategy by 31 March 1997 to achieve:

- (a) recognition of the need for Australia to move from a native forest based wood products industry to a plantation based wood products industry; and
- (b) management of that transition; and
- (c) the provision of assistance to workers financially disadvantaged by the prohibition on logging in high conservation value native forests or the phase out of the export of woodchips.

12 Act not to affect native title

This Act does not affect native title or any rights, interests or obligations existing under native title.

13 Regulations

The Governor-General may make regulations prescribing all matters:

- (a) required or permitted by this Act to be prescribed; or
- (b) necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying out or giving effect to this Act.
