> ${f B}^{E}$ it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows: --

Short title. commencement.

- 1. (1) This Act may be cited as the "Book Purchasers' citation and Protection (Amendment) Act, 1963".
 - (2) The Book Purchasers' Protection Act, 1899, as amended by subsequent Acts and by this Act, may be cited as the Book Purchasers' Protection Act, 1899-1963.
 - (3) This Act shall commence upon a day to be appointed by the Governor and notified by proclamation published in the Gazette.

2. The Book Purchasers' Protection Act, 1899-1934, is No. 26, 1963 amended—

- (a) by omitting from paragraph (a) of section five the Sec. 5. words "great primer" and by inserting in lieu (Certain thereof the words "the size prescribed by regulation contracts under this Act";
- (b) by inserting next after section eight the following New new section:—
 - 9. (1) The Governor may make regulations not Regulations. inconsistent with this Act prescribing all matters which by this Act are required or permitted to be prescribed or which are necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying out or giving effect to this Act.
 - (2) Such regulations shall—
 - (a) be published in the Gazette;
 - (b) take effect from the date of publication or from a later date to be specified in such regulations;
 - (c) be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen sitting days after publication if Parliament is in session and, if not, then within fourteen sitting days after the commencement of the next session.

If either House of Parliament passes a resolution of which notice has been given at any time within fifteen sitting days after such regulations have been laid before such House disallowing any regulation or part thereof, such regulation or part shall thereupon cease to have effect.
