An Act to amend the Business Agents Act, 1938-1954.

[Assented to 24th October, 1963.]

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows :

Short titles.

1. (1) This Act may be cited as the "Business Agents Act Amendment Act, 1963".

(2) The Business Agents Act, 1938-1954, as amended by this Act, may be cited as the "Business Agents Act, 1938-1963".

(3) The Business Agents Act, 1938-1954, is hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act".

Incorporation.

2. This Act is incorporated with the principal Act and that Act and this Act shall be read as one Act.

Amendment of principal Act, s. 18 (1).

3. Subsection (1) of section 18 of the principal Act is struck out and the following subsection is inserted in lieu thereof :—

(1) The fee payable for a business agent's licence shall be Three pounds, or, if the licence is issued between the thirtieth day of September and the thirty-first day of March, One pound ten shillings.

Amendment of principal Act, s. 19

4 Section 19 of the principal Act is amended—

(a) by striking out the words "five hundred pounds" in subsections (1) and (3) thereof and inserting in lieu thereof in each case the words "two thousand pounds"; and

(b) by repealing subsection (6) thereof.

5. Section 22 of the principal Act is amended—

(a) by striking out the words "six hundred pounds" in subsection (1) thereof and inserting in lieu thereof the words "two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds"; and

(b) by repealing subsection (6) thereof.

6. Until the first day of April, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-four, the amendments effected by this Act shall not apply to a person who immediately before the commencement of this Act was the holder of a business agent's licence.
