An Act to amend the Law relating to Bills of Lading. Le Wo. 31/61, 5.9 No 63001, 185,38(2) [Assented to, 1st September, 1859.]

WHEREAS by the custom of Merchants, a bill of lading of Preamble. goods being transferable by endorsement, the property in goods may thereby pass to the endorsee, but nevertheless all rights in respect of the contract contained in the bill of lading continue in the original shipper or owner, and it is expedient that such rights should pass with the property: Be it therefore Enacted, by the Governor-in-Chief of the Province of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the said Province, in this present Parliament assembled, as follows— A co

1. Every consignee of goods named in a bill of lading, and every Rights under bills of endorsee of a bill of lading, to whom the property in the goods signee or endorsee. therein mentioned shall pass, upon or by reason of such consignment or endorsement, shall have transferred to and vested in him all 18 & 150 rights of suit, and be subject to the same liabilities in respect of such goods as if the contract contained in the bill of lading had been made with himself.

2. Nothing herein contained shall prejudice or affect any right Not to affect right of of stoppage in transitu, or any right to claim freight against the or claim of freight.

3. Every bill of lading in the hands of a consignee or endorsee, Bills of lading in hands of consignee, for valuable consideration, representing goods to have been shipped &c., conclusive evidence of the shipped

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on board a vessel, shall be conclusive evidence of such shipment as against the master or other person signing the same, notwithstanding that such goods, or some part thereof, may not have been so shipped, unless such holder of the bill of lading shall have had actual notice, at the time of receiving the same, that the goods had not been, in fact, laden on board.

4. This Act may be cited as "The Bills of Lading Act, 1859."
