An Act to amend the Laws of the Customs in South Australia.

[Assented to, 12th November, 1863.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to alter the duties of Customs Preamble. imposed in the Province of South Australia in manner hereinafter provided—Be it therefore Enacted by the Governor-in-Chief of the Province of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the said Province, in this present Parliament assembled, as follows:—

1. In lieu of and instead of all other duties of Customs, there Duties. shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid unto Her Majesty for the uses of the said Province and support of the Government thereof, the several duties of Customs inserted, described, and set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and no other.

2. The Collector of Customs, and all officers of Customs in the lector of Customs. said Province, shall not be liable to and are hereby indemnified and protected against any action, claim, or damages to which he or they might otherwise have been liable by reason of any refusal to deliver any goods imported into the said Province after the second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, or in bond on that day, without payment of the duties by this Act authorized to be levied, or without payment of the duties authorized to be levied by any Act in force within the said Province, at the time of the coming into operation of this Act.

In the name and on behalf of the Queen I hereby assent to this Act.
