GEORGII V REGIS. A.D. 1929.

No. 1940.

An Act to amend the Criminal Law Consolidation Act, 1876, and for other purposes.

[Assented to, December 12th, 1929.]

BE it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Burnston. with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

1. This Act may be cited as the "Criminal Law Act, 1929."

Short title.

- 2. (1) For the purpose of removing doubts it is hereby declared Termination of that notwithstanding anything contained in any other Act, any writ of eapias. party in default as mentioned in section 367 of The Criminal Law Consolidation Act, 1876, may be imprisoned pursuant to a writ of capias issued under that section, but no such party shall be so imprisoned for more than six months.

- (2) When a writ of capias is issued under the said section against a party then serving a sentence of imprisonment the writ of capias shall be effective to keep him in custody for not more than six months after the termination of his sentence unless the Supreme Court otherwise directs.
- (3) The Sheriff shall discharge any party imprisoned pursuant to a writ of capias after the expiration of six months from the commencement of his imprisonment pursuant to the said writ of capias.
- 3. Section 135 of The Criminal Law Consolidation Act, 1876 is Amendment of amended by striking out the word "two" in the last line thereof and solidation Act, 1876, inserting in lieu thereof the word "five".
