An Act to further amend the Licensing Act, 1908.

*[Assented to, October 28th, 1915.]*

**B**E it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

**1.** (1) This Act may be cited alone as the "Licensing Act Short titles.  
Further Amendment Act, 1915."

(2) The Licensing Acts, 1908 and 1910, and this Act may be No. 970 of 1908.  
cited together as the "Licensing Acts, 1908 to 1915."

(3) The Licensing Act, 1908, is herein referred to as "the  
principal Act."

**2.** This Act shall come into force on a day to be fixed by the Commencement of  
Governor by proclamation published in the *Gazette*. Act.

**3.** This Act is incorporated with the other Acts mentioned in Incorporation with  
section 1, and those Acts and this Act shall be read as one Act. other Acts.

**4.** Subsection (1) of section 155 of the principal Act, is amended—  
i. by substituting the words "six in the evening" for the Amendment of  
words "eleven at night" in subdivision (c) of the said section 155 of Act  
subsubsection; and No. 970 of 1908—

ii. by striking out all the words in the said subdivision after  
the word "night" in the second line thereof.

**5.** (1) Section 109 of the principal Act is amended by sub- Consequent amend-  
stituting the words "six o'clock in the evening" for the words ments.

(2) Section 154 of the principal Act is amended by substituting the word "six" for the word "eleven" in the last line of subsection (1) thereof.

(3) Schedule B of the principal Act is amended by substituting the words "six o'clock in the evening" for the words "eleven o'clock at night" in Forms 2, 4, 7, and 8 contained in that Schedule.
