An Act to further amend the Stock Diseases Act, 1888.

[Assented to, November 21st, 1918.]

DE it Enacted by the Governor of the State of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Parliament thereof, as follows:

- 1. (1) This Act may be cited alone as the "Stock Diseases short titles. Act Further Amendment Act, 1918."
- (2) The Stock Diseases Acts, 1888 to 1915, and this Act may be cited together as the "Stock Diseases Acts, 1888 to 1918."
- (3) The Stock Diseases Act, 1888, is hereinafter referred to as No. 443 of 1888. "the principal Act."
- 2. This Act is incorporated with the other Acts mentioned in Incorporation with section 1 of this Act, and those Acts and this Act shall be read as one Act.
- 3. The definition of the term "drove" in section 3 of the Amendment of principal Act is amended by inserting the word "camels" after the principal Act, s. 3word "horses" in the first line thereof.

Definition of " drove."

4. Section 20 of the principal Act is amended by inserting the Amendment of ibid. word "camels" after the word "cattle" in the third, tenth, and s. 20twelfth lines thereof.

5. Notwithstanding anything contained in this or the principal Notice required by

or any Crown lands within any hundred, with any horses, cattle, or camels without having given the notice required by the said section 20 before entering upon such run, leased lands, or Crown lands, if such horses, cattle, or camels during the time occupied in such crossing are used for the purpose of drawing any conveyance or vehicle, or are ridden, harnessed, or laden, or accompany other horses, cattle, or camels which are so used, ridden, harnessed, or laden, as spare or extra horses, cattle, or camels, to be so used, ridden, harnessed, or laden in case of emergency or shortage
