An Act to amend the Law relating to Statutory
Declarations.

[Assented to, October 1st, 1902.]

BE it Enacted by the Governor, with the advice and consent of
the Parliament of South Australia, as follows:

1. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Act of the Imperial Parliament, number 5 and 6 William the Fourth, Chapter 62, the form contained in the Schedule annexed to this Act may be used and employed in any declaration under the said recited Act now by law authorised, as and in lieu of the form prescribed by and contained in the Schedule to the said recited Act. Form of declaration in Schedule may be used.

2. Any person who shall wilfully and corruptly make and subscribe any such declaration, knowing such declaration to be untrue in any material particular, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable, upon conviction thereof, to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding four years with hard labor. False declaration.

3. The said recited Act of the Imperial Parliament, number 5 and 6 William the Fourth, Chapter 62, may be cited as "The Statutory Declarations Act, 1835." Short title of Imperial Statute.

4. This Act may be cited as "The Statutory Declarations Act, 1902." Short title.
