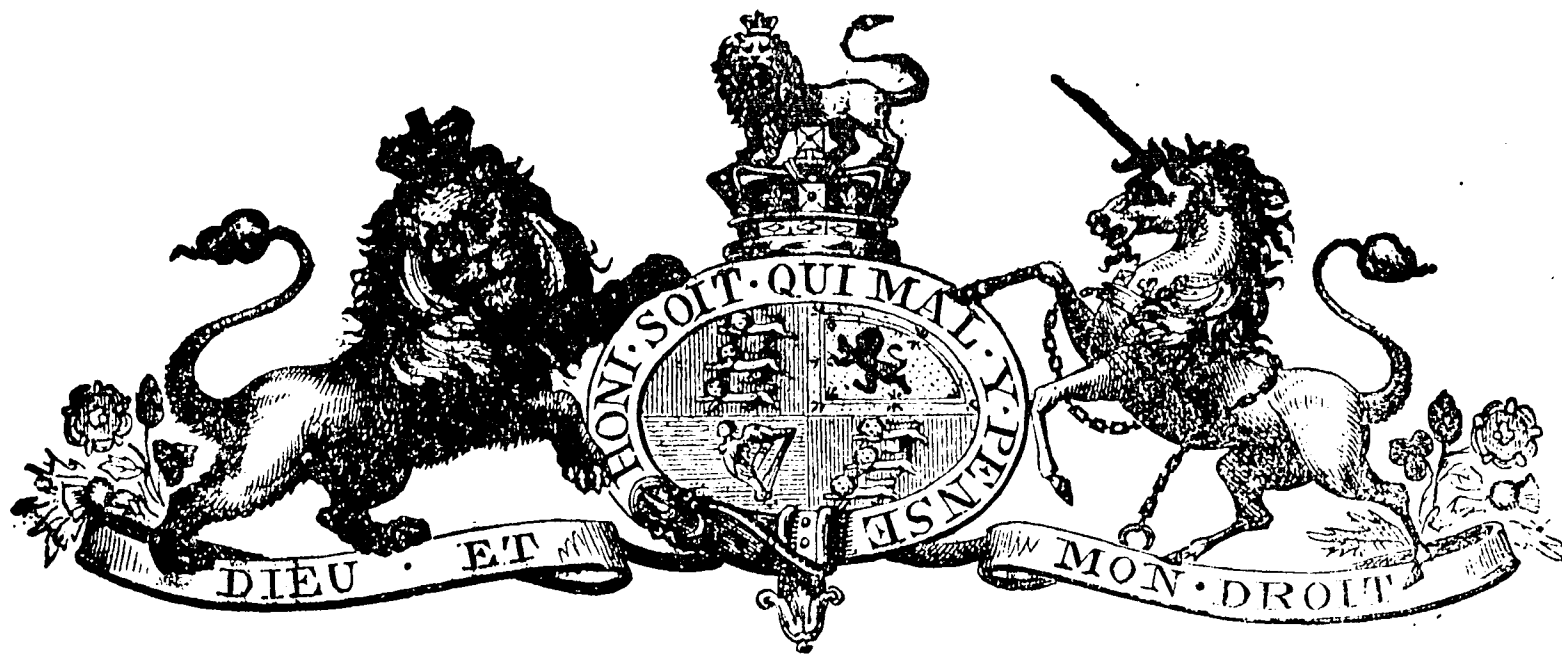

An Act to make Temporary Provision for the Issue of Licences to Sell Liquor on Shipboard. [16th December 1886.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of Victoria in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows (that is to say) :—

1. This Act shall be read and construed with and as part of "The Licensing Act 1885" hereinafter termed the "Principal Act." Construction.

2. Notwithstanding anything in the Principal Act contained, any person who at any time before the twenty-eighth day of December in the year One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six desires to obtain a packet licence for the unexpired portion of the said year shall proceed as follows (that is to say) :— Application for packet licences to 1st January, 1887.

Such person shall make application by delivering to the clerk of the licensing court of any licensing district comprised within the Metropolitan Group a notice in writing in the form in the Second Schedule to the Principal Act or to the same effect. Such notice shall be signed by the person so applying, and shall set forth his place of abode and such desire.

The licensing court to whose clerk such notice has been so delivered shall within forty-eight hours after such delivery proceed to hear and determine the application, and shall grant or refuse the same as they think fit. For every such licence a fee of Ten pounds shall be paid, and every such licence shall continue in force until the first day of January One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and no longer.
