AN ACT to Amend the Distress and Replevin Act, 1908. Title.
[4th September, 1950]

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Distress and Replevin Amendment Act, 1950, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Distress and Replevin Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act). Short Title.

2. The principal Act is hereby amended by repealing section five, and substituting the following section:— Exemption of furniture, &c., up to value of £100.

“ 5. All personal and family clothing, furniture, and household effects, and tools or implements of trade, not exceeding in all one hundred pounds in value, are hereby declared to be absolutely exempted from being seized, sold, or disposed of under any distress for rent.”
