Title.

An Act to amend the Judicature Act 1908.

[11 November 1953

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. (1) This Act may be cited as the Judicature Amendment Act 1953, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Judicature Act 1908.

(2) This Act shall be deemed to have come into force on the twenty-ninth day of June, nineteen hundred and

fifty-three.

> 2. (1) Section two of the Judicature Amendment Act 1913 (as amended by subsection two of section two of the Judicature Amendment Act 1935) is hereby further amended by inserting at the beginning the following subsection:

"(1) The Supreme Court shall consist of one Judge, to be called the Chief Justice of New Zealand, and ten other Judges:

"Provided that an additional Judge or Judges may be appointed whenever the Governor-General deems it necessary by reason of the absence or anticipated absence of any of the Judges on leave preliminary to retirement, and every such appointment shall be a permanent appointment from the time when it is made, and shall fill the vacancy next occurring in the office of Judge, not being a vacancy filled by an earlier appointment under this proviso."

(2) This section is in substitution for section two consequential of the Judicature Amendment Act 1935, as amended by section twenty-five of the Statutes Amendment Act 1948, and those sections are hereby accordingly repealed.

3. The Honourable Alexander Kingcome Turner, who Appointment of Hon. Mr Justice Turner. was appointed to be a Judge of the Supreme Court for a limited period on the twenty-ninth day of June, nineteen hundred and fifty-three, shall be deemed to have been duly appointed permanently on that date under the proviso to subsection one of section two of the Judicature Amendment Act 1913, as enacted by section two of this Act.
