AN ACT to Amend the Law relating to District Courts.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

The Judge of every District Court has had and shall have the same power as the Supreme Court to grant probates of wills and letters of administration within his own district, unless a Judge of the Supreme Court resided or resides, at the time of the granting of the same, within such district.</p> <p>10 During the temporary absence of a Judge of the Supreme Court from his usual place of residence in any such district he shall be deemed not to be or have been resident therein.</p> <p>4.
