A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to regulate the Admission to Practice in the Courts  
of Law. Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand  
5 in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as  
follows :—

1. The Short Title of this Act is “The Law Practitioners Act,  
1892 (No. 2).” Short Title.

2. Notwithstanding any law in force in the colony relative to  
10 the admission of persons to be barristers and solicitors of the Supreme  
Court of the Colony, from and after the passing of this Act every  
male person of the full age of twenty-one years, and of whose good  
fame and reputation and of whose learning any one or more of the  
Judges of the said Court shall be satisfied, shall be entitled to be  
15 admitted as a barrister and solicitor of the said Court, and generally  
to the practice of the law, and to all the rights and privileges thereof,  
and shall be enrolled without fee as a barrister and solicitor of the  
said Court : Admission to the  
practice of the law.

20 Provided every such person shall, previously to such admission,  
be examined in law, and the Judges of the said Court shall from time  
to time prescribe the place and manner of such examination, and  
thereby decide upon the competency for admission as aforesaid of  
every such person.
