A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to amend the Public Health Act, 1908.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Public Health Amendment Act, 1910, and shall form part of and be read together with the Public Health Act, 1908.

Short Title.

2. By-laws made under section one hundred and eight of the Public Health Act, 1908, may prescribe the minimum frontage and area of land on which a dwellinghouse may be erected in the district or any specified part thereof:

Additional power as to by-laws.

Provided that such area shall not be less than one-fifth of an acre in any district or specified part in which a sewerage system does not exist.

3. In districts in which no sewerage-works exist, the local authority, in lieu of raising a separate rate as mentioned in section sixty of the principal Act, may levy an annual fee on the occupier of every property on which a dwellinghouse is erected in the district, or any defined part thereof.

Annual fee for removal of refuse, &c.

4. (1.) The Governor may from time to time, whenever in his opinion it is necessary, by Order in Council declare any defined part of New Zealand to be a "vaccination area" within which Part IV of the principal Act (except section one hundred and eighty-two) shall have effect.

Vaccination areas.

(2.) Every such Order in Council shall have effect within the vaccination area therein defined until revoked by a subsequent Order in Council.

(3.) On such revocation the said area shall cease to be a vaccination area.

(4.) Except within a vaccination area no proceedings shall be instituted for the recovery of any penalty under sections one hundred and seventy to one hundred and seventy-three of the principal Act.
