ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS SALE CONTROL ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

Mr. HEKE, in Committee, to move the addition of the following new clauses :—

A. Every husband, wife, parent, child, guardian, or employer, or other person who is injured in person, property, or means of support by an intoxicated person, or in consequence of the intoxication, habitual or otherwise, of any person, or in consequence of any accident happening to such intoxicated person caused wholly or in part by such intoxication, shall have a right of action, severally or jointly, against any person who by selling or giving intoxicating liquor has caused wholly or in part such intoxication.

B. If in any licensed house any person has drunk to excess of intoxicating liquor therein furnished to him, and in a state of intoxication from such drinking has come to his death by suicide or accident caused by such intoxication, the licensee of such licensed house, and also any person who for him, or employed by him, delivered to such person any part of the liquor by which such intoxication was caused, shall be jointly and severally liable in damages as for personal wrong in any action brought by the legal representatives of such deceased person.

C. On application to the police officer of the district by any relative or friend of any male aboriginal native of New Zealand who may be found by such relative or friend drinking liquor to excess in any licensed house, the police shall forthwith apply to the Magistrate for the district for an order under section one hundred and sixty-seven of "The Licensing Act, 1881," to be issued against such male aboriginal native; and such order shall remain in operation until otherwise ordered by the said Magistrate.

Provided that after the issuing of any such order any person selling, giving, or supplying liquor to such person shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

D. After the passing of this Act, no aboriginal native or European shall take any liquor into the Maori meeting-house known as Rawiri, situate on the Kaiti Block, Gisborne, or into or about the *marae* of such meeting-house; and any person creating a breach of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not less than

Hon. Sir R. STOUT, in Committee, to move the following new clauses :—

A. The bar of every hotel shall, so far as selling alcoholic liquors to any persons not lodgers in the hotel nor *bonâ fide* travellers visiting the hotel, be deemed a shop in the meaning of "The Shops and Shop-assistants Act, 1894."

B. Every general election day, and every day on which the local option or national option poll is taken, shall be deemed to be a Sunday within the meaning of the Licensing Acts.
