**THE CUSTOMS EXPORT PROHIBITION ORDER 1939, No. 2.**

GALWAY, Governor-General.

**ORDER IN COUNCIL.**

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 15th day of March, 1939.

Present :

THE RIGHT HON. M. J. SAVAGE PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by section 47 of the Customs Act, 1913, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and being of the opinion that the prohibition hereinafter enacted is necessary in the public interest, doth hereby order as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Customs Export Prohibition Order 1939, No. 2.
2. The exportation of fresh vegetables of all kinds and fresh tomatoes, save with the consent of the Minister of Customs, is prohibited.
3. The Order in Council made under the said Act on the 12th day of August, 1936,\* and the Customs Export Prohibition Order 1939, No. 1,† are revoked.
4. This Order in Council shall come into force on the day following notification in the *Gazette* of the making thereof.
