'Breaking Barriers'

Preparations are well underway for the 4th ALIA New Librarians Symposium, (NLS4) to be held in Melbourne this December. (As with previous years, our theme of



'Breaking Barriers' is intended to engage with new librarians on issues that they regularly face.) NLS4 will be held over two days, on the 5th and 6th of December, in the Melbourne CBD venue of Citiclub on Queen. CQ's modern function rooms provide the perfect environment for sharing ideas and interacting with other professionals. Furthermore, the CBD location is easily accessible by public transport, and is in close proximity to Melbourne's many city attractions – all within walking distance. The organising committee is now calling for abstracts for papers on the symposium theme of 'Breaking Barriers' to be submitted by 4 April 2008. They face numerous stereotypical hurdles including the difficulties of generational gaps in the workplace, differences in professional attitudes, and the challenging ever-present public image of librarians. Furthermore, new librarians are faced with barriers to their own professional development and that of their teams, despite an increasing need to adapt to emerging trends in the industry. By exploring the theme of 'Breaking Barriers', new librarians will have the opportunity to share their experiences facing these hurdles and discuss strategies to overcome them.

#### Call for submissions

The themes for 'Library stars: best of the best' will reflect the 'dreaming' themes for the ALIA 2008 Biennial Conference and we invite you to demonstrate excellence in one of the following areas:

- Are you entrepreneurial (eg in your marketing, fundraising, grants, partnerships, developing sustainable services)?

What has your organisation accomplished? How do you know that your library has made a difference in people's lives?

The money will go towards the upgrade of the public and digital facilities of the State Library to make sure Western Australians have best possible quality access to this key learning facility.

The Western Australian Premier's Australia-Asia Literary Award is also to receive a \$1.2million boast.
